Chairman's Report

Simon Moore JP - Chair Swimming Canterbury West Coast

I am writing this year's report as my last as Swimming Canterbury West Coast's chair. I have enjoyed my time, but as someone said recently, it's time for some fresh new blood to take this role on. I will also resign from the board at the end of the next term. I have really enjoyed my time on the board and as the Chair, but it is very time consuming, I have several new 'ventures' keeping me very busy, and unfortunately not everyone appreciates the time that board members are required to put into this commitment. As I have said many times, if you think you have something to offer come off the sidelines and join the board.

Over the last year we have been meeting with the Christchurch City Council, trying to negotiate rates for our swimmers and for our events, including how fees are paid etc. That's been a long and drawn out process and whilst we didn't get our way completely, I believe we got the best we could under the circumstances. As we are seeing, it's getting harder and harder to keep a lid on costs and we are lucky that the board have worked hard to keep a 'war chest' for the times that we will need it, and those days have been, and more are, coming quickly. Whilst the temptation may be to spend up large, that has to be tempered with the future in mind, and the very real threat that funding from traditional sources is and will continue to get harder to obtain.

Our Operations Manager Deb Rahurahu, works tirelessly behind the scenes to try and get funding from charity trusts to help fund equipment, support initiatives and events, meaning that we can keep our reserves accordingly, but that funding is getting harder to get and we have to face the fact that we will have to start putting our hand into our pocket eventually, which will see our funds reduce, possibly rapidly.

We continue to proactively work with the Christchurch City Council, The Rata Foundation and other organisations promoting swimming throughout Canterbury. We have managed to secure funding to allow the continued employment of Quinton Hurley as our Marketing Assistant. His role continues to develop into a very important one, as acknowledged by the continued funding from the Christchurch City Council. The 'have a go' meets organised by Quinton and Deb have been extremely successful, with the help of our fantastic volunteers, and are very well received by the participants and their families. More of these will take place over the next year.

Quinton continues to develop the website, and his skills with that and social media are an asset to our organisation. The money he is saving us is substantial, and his skills and achievements with this should not be underestimated. His knowledge and participation in our sport allows him to target those areas that swimmers are interested in, and we are indeed lucky to have him on board.

We continue to work with the coaching group on the squad pathways and associated meets and I am sure that this will continue over the next year. We need to develop our pathways and support that work going forward, and there is a commitment to do so.

I hate to say it, but Parakiore's opening has been further delayed and now it is anticipated to not open until December 2025, which is quite frankly disastrous. We are continuing to have more generations of our swimmers not having a regional 50 metre pool and these further delays mean our athletes are going to miss out on more opportunities. Events pencilled in by Swimming New Zealand and the CCC have had to be shifted to other regions, meaning that once again our region misses out. I am sure you all share the disappointment once again, but the shame of it all is that we are getting used to it, and let's face it, we are powerless to do anything about it.

Having said all that, our region, compared to others, has not seen the exodus and our numbers continue to be strong. We have new clubs forming, which is not being seen in other regions and we are often asked what we are doing to achieve this. There is no simple answer and we believe the reasons are numerous, but the have a go's, strong social media presence, quality of the clubs and coaching, and strong regional representation are but a few of the reasons.

We are very lucky to have dedicated volunteers who are stepping up to maintain our gear, which is very expensive, temperamental, and costly to replace. Their skills and dedication are invaluable. I am not going to name them because those of us involved know who they are, and I want to thank them for their continued assistance.

Once again, I also wish to acknowledge the organisations that give us grants for other parts of the operations such as our Operations Managers and Marketing Assistants salary, medals and ribbons, pool hire, timing equipment etc. Without the assistance of these charitable organisations, we would struggle to survive, so thank you sincerely for your continued support. As I have said - we should not take for granted that this funding will always be available, as the funds are getting smaller and the number of organisations seeking grants are getting bigger.

I have already mentioned the small group of

our volunteers that maintain our gear, but there is a wider group of volunteers that allow us to operate. From club level support through to National and International events, we are almost overrepresented, which is fantastic for our region. I am in awe of you all. Your time and dedication cannot be underestimated, and I once again want to sincerely thank each and every one of you.

I still continue to encourage members, particularly parents of swimmers, to consider becoming a volunteer at meets. We need timekeepers and technical officials all the time and if we have a big pool (excuse the pun) then we can spread the workload more evenly and not leave it to the same faces all the time. Also, please consider lending a hand at the end of meets to help clean up and pack the gear away, especially if the meet is being run by your club. Many hands make light work and the whole pool can be undressed and cleaned up in about 20 minutes if we all pitch in.

And I have said this before, don't criticise from the sidelines, come and get involved - that's far more helpful and is essential for our sport to be able to operate and exist.

To our athletes, technical officials and coaches that have been, and are, travelling overseas to international events - we are extremely proud of you and your achievements. You represent your clubs, regions and country when you travel overseas, and you do that to an extremely high standard.

I continue to be in awe of our Operations Manager Debbie Rahurahu, without whom we could simply not operate as we do. She goes above and beyond, working after hours, at meets during her time off, even taking her laptop away to the USA with her when she is visiting family. She is hugely respected throughout the country for her knowledge, ideas, passion for the sport of swimming and forthrightness, which is often needed. I know that she puts her job and the sport before most things, and I admire her for that. I find myself having to tell her to slow down and relax but she ignores me!!

Finally, to the swimmers. We are all in it for you. We want to see you achieve great things and whilst not everyone will make the national or world stage, as long as you try your best, enjoy what you are doing and remain dedicated you will be a winner, no matter what.

Thanks to those that have supported and worked with me during my tenure as the Chairperson of Swimming Canterbury West Coast. It sure hasn't been easy with a lack of a 50m pool and a global pandemic in the mix. The fact that we have come out the other side mostly intact and financially sound is a credit to you all. I urge you to continue to work with your board and come up with ideas and share them. The board are a small group of dedicated volunteers, all in fulltime employment in varying roles and of varying experience in the sport. We have a very diverse board with young, old (me), parents of swimmers both present and past and ex swimmers who have had varying time on the board.

The Board does not pretend to have the answers to everything, after all, the Board are made of members just like you! If all members throughout the region work collaboratively and share our visions we can move forward and be even more successful, whilst making sure the region stands on its feet financially.

I want to offer the board's sincere thanks to Fiona Campbell for her stellar work on the Events committee, a position that she has held for many years, but now steps down due to rotation. We all know the mountain of voluntary work that Fiona has been and continues to do for SCWC and I know that she will continue with the work she is doing, despite having to step down. Also, our sincere thanks to Marlene Morrison for all the tireless work she has done as a Trustee for the Doreen Brown Trust which has recently been wound up as the funds have been distributed over many years, to the benefit of school children in our region. Marlene's behind the scenes work over the years has been extremely beneficial and it is done without fuss and or recognition. Thanks to you both.

I wish my successor all the best moving forward.



Technical Report

Christine Cassin - Chair SCWC Technical Committee

The 2022-2023 year has been largely undisrupted and has seen a return to unrestricted swim meets.

With a full calendar of meets we have been able to return to training technical officials on the pool deck, where numbers have permitted.

For Designated Meets to be approved by Swimming NZ there is a minimum number of qualified technical officials required at each session, which means we need more than the minimum number before we can offer our officials the opportunity to train for new positions.

This year Ron Clarke, our National Assessor, has qualified a National Referee, Stuart Challenger Hokitika and two National Inspectors of Turns.

The Swimming NZ Technical Advisory Committee was restructured in December and will be introducing a new assessment system.

We have also qualified seven Regional Inspectors of Turns and a Regional Referee Glenys McKenzie,

Vikings Club.

Unfortunately Parakiore has been delayed further and is now due to be completed in 2025.

We did not hold SCWC Long Course Championships in January 2023 and it has been decided that we will not hold another Long Course Championships until Parakiore opens.

SCWC hosted the South Island Country and Town Meet in Greymouth in March and I would like to thank all the Technical Officials who travelled to ensure we had the numbers required for the Meet to be approved.

SCWC continues to be well represented by our Technical Officials at Swimming NZ Meets.

I would like to thank everyone for their continued support over the last year from the swimmers, parents, coaches, technical officials, technical committee, events committee to the Board.

Events Report

Fiona Campbell - Chairperson of the SCWC Events Committee

The SCWC League was held and twice this year with a Junior division being added. Round robin 'games' between Clubs were held in three locations over one weekend and the finals for all three divisions were held on Sunday afternoon at Selwyn. Each club wore a differ coloured t-shirt. The racing and competition was furious - Club honour was on the line! Thanks to all those who helped at these sessions as it was a bit frantic at times!

It was decided not to travel for Canterbury Championships again this year and just reinstate the Championship when we have a long course pool hopefully in 2025!

With no Canterbury Championships the coaches organised a 'Coaches Invitational' short course meet at the end of January. It was for all our registered swimmers. Those aged 13 and over swam heats and finals. The 12 and Unders swam timed finals in separate sessions. It was very successful and popularhelped by the generous amounts of money as prizes!

The other regional meets, Development Championships, Juniors and Short Course, were held as usual. In future the Development Championships will be called the Memorial Meet (to avoid confusion with Development/Designated meets.) The Development Championships and SCWC Juniors were well attended but unfortunately the numbers were

down for SCWC Short Course.

SCWC hosted South islands Country and Town meets this year. It was held at Greymouth. Numbers were very low so we added an open meet for those who wanted to qualify for Div 2s. It was a very successful meet.

The Events Committee feel that the Tier System for meets in its present format is no longer effective. Pool bookings are more flexible and the number of swimmers at these meets is dropping.

We still want to present a balanced calendar during the year to make sure we cater to all our groups: older swimmers, faster swimmers, younger swimmers, beginner swimmers, but we would like Clubs to have more choices for their meets, with regard to ages, qualifying times, events swum etc.

We would like to thank all the officials for all the time they spend at meets especially those who no longer have any swimmers – without them we could not hold approved meets.

We would also like to thank all the swimmers and their parents for supporting all the meets and helping on poolside. Finally we would like to thank the coaches for all their efforts at keeping the meets going and encouraging their swimmers to attend them so that they provide good competition.

Post-COVID lock-down number one, came lock-down number two and certainly a change of circumstances for a few and implications on the Club! This saw us, take a dip in membership numbers and changes to our coaching team, when Roly's health took a turn for the worse with him going into hospital in July and only being released in January, with Satori and Charles coming on board. As people became aware that life was returning back to some form of normal, our squad numbers have started to grow. We were lucky enough (even at alert level red) to still host the Ruth Woolley Memorial swim meet, with great support from the SCWC community. We had senior and junior swimmers qualify and/or



represent the club at regional and national meets over the past year, resulting in a number of top three and top 10 finishes. Through the challenges of this last year, we also saw Sophie compete the at 2020 Paralympics in Tokyo and her selection for the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham and the selection of Chris to the SNZ Team competing at the Mare Nostrum Series in Europe. As always, our club looks forward to supporting all our swimmers in their endeavours for the upcoming 2022-2023 season.

Selwyn Swim Club

Another exciting season this year for the Selwyn Swim Club. We are extremely thankful to have the support of our great team of Swim coaches, Committee, Volunteers, and members.

This year has seen a significant change in momentum for Selwyn. We have more swimmers qualifying for zonal and national meets, and results are generally in an upward trend in all age groups. We've nearly doubled our qualifiers for national meets, this is a fantastic measure of the effort that our swimmers and coaches are putting in.

Some of our club's key performance achievements this year have been:

NZ Short Course 2022 - eight qualifiers, six attended. NZ Short Course Champions Ella Benn 100 IM and 50 Free, Celyn Edwards 50 Fly, 50 Back, 50 Free. A further nine podium finishes from the three para swimmers.



NZ Championships 2023 - five qualifiers, two attended. NZ Champion Ella Benn in 200 Free and 40 Free. A further four podium placings for Ella. Dylan Booysens also attended and achieved 100% pb's at his first appearance at the highest-level domestic meet.

NZ Age Groups - nine qualifiers, six attended. Three podium finishes from Mille Long, along with Top 10 placings by Flynn Grace, Harrison Doak, Ben Smith, and Holly Smith.

Swim Timaru

We have had a positive year.

Our membership numbers are up compared to last year, although we have a greater proportion of Club Swimmers rather than Competitive.

Coach Oscar retired and Shane Jones took over his role. The changeover has gone smoothly, helped by the fact that Ben Prebble remains as Assistant Coach.

In addition to Local meets, our swimmers have travelled and stayed as a team to the Jasi meet, SCWC Leagues, Makos Junior Festival, SIC&T, South Island Long Course, NZ Division II and NZ Short Course. We had one swimmer at the NZ Swimming Champs. Only one of our swimmers attended NAGs this year but she was well looked after by the Wharenui team and medalled in 200 Back.

Swim Timaru



We have had three major fundraising events. Our Swim Timaru meet, the PrimePort Timaru Ocean Swim and the swimming section of the South Island Masters Games. Some of the money raised has been spent on a new starter. We have also organized several evening 'Grab-a-Time' meets, inviting swimmers from our neighbouring clubs to join us.

Triton Swim Club

As Triton approaches its 1st Anniversary in July, the club achieved a milestone season of fast growing. Heartfelt gratitude to Reuben and his young and passionate coaching team. Reuben, with more than ten years of established coaching experience, leads his team not only introducing the young swimmers to a new world of swimming sports, but also building a strongly bonded Triton community. Jason, father of two swimmers, gives unique support from parents' perception. Stacey, a canterbury record holder, enables the club to provide specific attention and assistance to young female swimmers. For the past season, Triton swimmers presented themselves in both regional and club level meets including 2022 Apollo Junior. Majority of Triton swimmers started with no experience with competitive swimming, and up till May, one third of them achieved tier2 qualifying time for at least one event. Special congratulations go to Louis Tian who sets a new



Canterbury West Coast record for 9-year-old boy for 50m and 200m backstroke. Triton couldn't have achieved all above without the full support from SCWC. Preparations are in full swing for the first Triton Meet in November. We look forward to seeing more enthusiastic young swimmers!

Temuka Swimming Club

This was a challenging year for Temuka Swimming Club, our pool closed due to a lack of lifeguards, our amazing head coach of 30 years Marty Pow 'retired' and our target meet for the year excluded junior swimmers. The previous 12 months can only be described as memorable!



Statement of Accounting Policies

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

Reporting Entity

Swimming Canterbury West Coast Incorporated is incorporated as an association under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

These financial statements are special purpose reports that have been prepared in accordance with its stated accounting policies exclusively for the benefit of the members of Swimming Canterbury West Coast Incorporated.

Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation

The accounting policies adopted are not necessarily in conformity with generally accepted accounting practice, and accordingly should only be relied on for the expressly stated purpose. However, the Region is of the view that the financial reports give adequate disclosure about the Region's financial

performance and financial position to be presented to the members in fulfillment of their annual reporting obligations.

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of financial performance and financial position on a historical cost basis have been followed by the club, unless otherwise stated in the Specific Accounting Policies.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and the financial position, have been applied:

Stock

Stock valuation is the lower of cost and net realisable value.



Property, Plant & Equipment

Significant fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been calculated to allocate the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives. Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line method. The rates of depreciation are:

Furniture and Equipment 10-25%pa

Electronic Timing Equipment 20-25%pa

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are valued at their expected realisable value.

Contingencies

There are no known contingent claims or liabilities.

Grant Income

Grants are initially recorded in the Statement of Financial Position, but are transferred and recognised as revenue in the year the condition, upon the which the grant is obtained, is met. Any grants unspent are held until the relevant expenditure, or are returned to the original donor.

Taxation

Swimming Canterbury West Coast Inc is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Subsequent Events

The Swimming Canterbury West Coast Board are not aware of any matter or circumstance since the end of the financial year, not otherwise mentioned within this report, that has significantly affect or may significantly affect the operations of the association, the result of those operations, or the state of affairs of the association.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with last year.

Report on the Audit of the Performance Report

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Swimming Canterbury West Coast Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2023, the statement of financial performance, the statement of service performance for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the accompanying financial statements are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the stated accounting policies.

This report is made solely to the Committee, as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Committee those matters which we are required to state to them in the auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the members, as a body, for our audit procedures, for this report, or for the opinion we have formed.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with similar organisations, controls over cash revenues such as donations and fundraising prior to being recorded is limited and there are no practical procedures to determine the effect of that limited control. Consequently, we are unable to determine whether any adjustments to these amounts were necessary.

We conducted our audit of the statement of financial performance, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ)), and the audit of the entity information and statement of service performance in accordance with the International Standard on Assurance Engagements (New Zealand) ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the performance report is free

from material misstatement. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report.

We are independent of the Committee in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Committee and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in the Society.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution and Use

Without modifying our conclusion, we draw attention to the Basis of Preparation paragraph in the statement of accounting policies, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the stated Accounting Policies of the Society exclusively for the benefit of the members of the Club. Our report is intended solely for the members of the Club and should not be distributed to or used by parties other than the members of the Club.

Committee' Responsibilities for the Financial Statements

The Committee are responsible on behalf of the Society for determining that the special purpose framework adopted is acceptable in the Society's circumstances, the preparation of financial statements, and for such internal control as the Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Committee are responsible, on behalf of the Society, for assessing the Committee's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern

and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee either intend to liquidate the Society or cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (NZ) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

We also provide the Committee with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.
